### **HISTORICAL EVENTS**

Guest Speaker - Patricia Wenskunas, Crime Survivors Founder and Chief Executive Officer

Patricia started the organization in Irvine over 20 years ago, 2003, and now serves many areas. Her personal trainer came in, acted violently, and threatened the life of her and her 12-year old son at that time. She readily admits that she has taken it afar in the other direction and works way too hard. She has been recommended by many to take a vacation. When she finally went to Hawaii, the fires unfortunately occurred. She had another situation where someone significant in her life had passed away. Now, she's a little cautious about taking vacations.

Patricia notes that the climate is much worst for victims now. Though the D.A. and Sheriff who are in place today do care for victims, she has seen many criminals released continuously, driven previously with Gascon. If they release the Mendenez Brothers, she points out, it will open a whole new wave where people would re-open their cases.

# Chris' Happy Bucket



Ron and Shirley Lashmett are both happy our speaker Patricia is here. Shirley added that The Field of Honor is going on. Shirley contributed a sad dollar as the Newport Harbor Club has 40 members, but only 4 show up, where she is one of the four.

Chris Tiemann provided an update on Uncle Jim, where he now needs 12 hours of care daily. She is also sad of the losses of her brother and the daughter of a best friend.

Shirley Kohlmeier had a sad dollar as The Meridian is closed down without power until 2pm today due to solar panel installation.

Tom Scheil is excited that he will be participating in a Car Show at The Meridian on Father's Day. They magically find some way to display many cars and parking for the visitors, despite the challenges of parking there.

Bob Wilson has returned from 10 days in Oklahoma. He loved the weather as they had no tornado, no rain, then Hell broke loose the day

Victims are scared to death with these rel'eases. How do you prevent things from happening?' becomes the question of concern.

Her group helps all victims of violent crimes, though children that have been abused and domestic violence are the main areas they have been focusing on more recently. Unexpectedly, 4-6 year olds are performing violent sexual acts, where they have been seeing it in video games and social media. One may be victimized, but Patricia emphasizes that one does not have to live a victim's life.

Patricia is proud of the relationships with law enforcement and the resource center her group has in Santa Ana. They are housed in 1500 square feet of a donated space by Dr. Choudary.

As an example, many children with their parents come in for baby wipes, sanitary goods, and basic necessities, as well as gift cards for groceries and food. They also offer classes such as Art for Healing and Self-Defense. The number of attendees can range from as little as 56 to 270 people. They also have peer-to-peer support group.

Advocates are leaving as they burn-out, and they are trying to take care of their staff to minimize attrition. They have events such as Wrap around the Holiday where gift giving is involved to their Halloween Harvest. Many survivors come back and help support financially or become mentors. 1200 people last year were involved in Christmas. Over 750 Christmas Stockings were given away last year. Every penny matters, 92-94 percent go back to the community. They maintain a small staff to keep liabilities down. They now help over 3000 people annually now.

They now partner with all the local shelters and the Chapman University local hospital, rape kits, Domestic Violence strangulation. Forever 21 is unfortunately now closed, as they use to donate \$200k worth of clothing.

They encourage having a safety plan in-place. They are now seeing young adults killing their parents, 18 incidents in Southern CA in recent times.

DUI's are higher now than they have been. Mental health is a crisis, including teenager suicide, where they recently seen one of an 8 year old.

Patricia sees hope in our kids, despite noting that we can never go back.

Doug believes a public hanging or guillotine would readily address our social ills, though would take 'business' away from Patricia, unfortunately, as he points out that there are not enough consequences in our society today.

Patricia notes that some victims may say 'they're not a bank' or 'a whooping bag', noting where things are out there. Whether you win a baseball game or not, everyone gets a prize. The minimum wage has

after they left. They had 14 family members from WA, CA, ID, and TX that visited.

Doug Graham is happy that he is a grown up. He has 3 days of soccer for Jed's tournaments in Norco. Tom noted the name Norco was derived from North Corona.

Johnny Tai unexpectedly saw 2 straight days of faces, a smiling one in his hair product and the other on his yogurt lid. The phenomenon is called pareidolia.

M.I.A. (Missing In Action) Members: As Dave Black is in Texas today visiting his son, Tom did a great job as Acting President. Harvey Schuster is M.I.A. Romy unfortunately is unable to attend due her scheduled extensive work day, likely the great Memorial Day sales at Sleep Number. gone up to over \$20. The kids today want to start at the management position, whereas it took someone over 30 years to become one in the past. The ills of society are very apparent.

Tom asks Patricia, 'have you had contact with those when you began your organization?'. Patricia notes that she does with the law enforcement agencies, such as Irvine Police. She brought many of them back after 10 years, at their gala, to recognize them.

Patricia notes that the undocumented have been bouncing to different locations. There were some that noted they were victims of crime and they were not. She doesn't want to doubt someone, given the circumstances, yet she now has to ask if they have a police report, to distribute the gift cards (to the true victims).

A woman with a child were sitting outside the post office. She would pinch the kid's leg to make the kid cry, when someone would walk by, to entice donations. People tend to give when a kid is in pain. Scams! The woman was taken in by the authorities.

One fella would drive up to a kid (potential for human trafficking) and tell the kid that he is picking up the kid on behalf of the kid's parents. One woman would pull up afterwards, act concerned for the kid, and say 'what are you doing to the kid?'. The kid would move towards the woman for safety, and then becomes a victim of human trafficking.

Teachers are not speaking out these days, as they are afraid. Meanwhile, a 6<sup>th</sup> grader is smashing the head of another 6<sup>th</sup> grader outside.

Patricia concluded with her presentation by noting she is grateful for the work SOCE is doing and would love to partner again.

Patricia clarifies that their address is not publicized for safety purposes, particularly of their victims. For donations, they do have a P.O. Box. One example, a guy with a machete came after staff members of another non-profit.

Patricia emphasizes that bullying is going on and they do bullying prevention. The bullying is on another level today, especially found in grade school. As an example, they are all vaping in 6<sup>th</sup> grade per a conversation she had with one parent.

Always know where every penny of your child goes, per Doug (it reveals things).

Patricia emphasized 'don't let kids sleep over a friend's house, as you do not know who is there. Some become sexual victims.

The room applauded Patricia for the reality check she had shared with our members today.
